At the national level, the Geological Society of America (GSA) held their annual meeting in Boston this fall. Through the efforts of the NH Council of Professional Geologists (NHCPG), the NH Geological Society and the staff of the NH Geological Survey, the NH Geosciences were well represented. The NHCPG and the NH Geological Society shared a booth that attracted many inquiries about NH geology, PG licensing and NH geoscience business.

On the state level, the NH Geological Survey was formally established within the Department of Environmental Services. State Geologist, David Wunsch is working hard to create a survey that will serve New Hampshire's geoscience needs.

Our strength will come from combining the varied interests, enthusiasm and expertise of NHCPG and NH Geological Society members. Taking the input from our memberships into consideration, it is hoped that, by this time next year, the proposed reorganization will be in place as the Geological Society of New Hampshire.

## **Hubbard Brook Geologic Map**


We are pleased to announce that the new bedrock geologic map of the Hubbard Brook Experimental Forest is now published and available online at:
